A Note from the President

My favorite time of the year is once again upon us with cool temps, brilliant leaves, birds flying overhead, football on TV and time spent in the woods with nature. Nothing better from my perspective, especially after an enjoyable summer on Fish Trap Lake. I hope your summer was great and the fall season is shaping up to be outstanding. As I sit down and write this letter, I am looking out the window on a marvelous day with more great weather coming this week.

I would like to update you on a few things to let you know what we have been working on. Steve McComas (Blue Water Science) was at the lake in August scuba diving, testing and observing the condition of Fish Trap. He gave us a quick briefing prior to our September board meeting and is continuing to work on his report for us, which I look forward to seeing soon. As a reminder, he will be with us at our annual meeting in 2024, and we will publish his report on the website.

At our landing this year, we upgraded a plug wrench that had stripped on the CD3 station, which was used a lot, and I just heard we had a new dock delivered this fall by the DNR, which hopefully makes launching and landing easier for all. While water levels are down after our summer drought, we have maintained a watchful eye on our eager beavers and their dam-building enterprise to ensure our lake has appropriate outflows as needed. We are watching bogs as well.

We continue to hear positive comments on the improved noise levels at night with the silencing of the train whistles from the closure of the crossing and, less frequently, a lament or two of those sounds from the past.

Amy Kowalzek informs us that her team is working on some updates to the lakeshore ordinances, after a couple of years focused on farmland ordinances. These will be presented to the Board of Commissioners later this year or early next. Plan to join us at next year's annual meeting to hear her updates. On this subject, there have been whispers that we, as a lake association board, drive these changes. We don't. We do, however, fully support their work to improve the quality of our lake and life around it and will present any concerns that property owners may bring forward to us on proposed changes. One exception was our work to ensure all septic systems on the lake were up to current standards and functioning well. We pushed the County to take action on this issue several years ago.

Hey, if you promise not to tell anyone, I will let you in on a secret -- fishing is quite good on Fish Trap Lake. Whether you're looking for prized walleyes or tasty panfish, or enjoy battling northern pike, muskellunge or bass, our lake has good numbers of them. And most of us really don't fish much, so they keep getting bigger. Moreover, I am told bass taste good from our water, so don't be afraid to make a meal of one or two.

1. Call to Order: Scott Schnuckle called the meeting to order at 9:30 am. Scott welcomed Fish Trap Lake Association Members (FTLPOA). Board members were introduced.

2. Secretary's Report: Chuck Salter motioned to accept the minutes from the Spring Board Meeting. Ron Nypan seconded it and the motion carried. The minutes can be found in the Spring Newsletter as well as on the website.

3. Treasurer's Report: Gary Ziehmman submitted the Treasurer's report.

Total membership of the FTLPOA for 2023/169, 2022/216, 2021/220; 2020/219; 2019/216. 55 property owners (PO) have prepaid for 2024. The Treasurer's report was accepted as presented.

4. Guest Speakers:

A. MN House Representative, Ron Kresha. Ron Kresha no longer represents this District, but he owns property on Fish Trap Lake. Due to his familiarity with this area, he will continue to address any PO issues. A message can be left on his website, or he can be reached at phone number 651-297-4247.

B. Morrison County (MC) Representatives:

1. Shawn Larson, MC Sheriff: Sheriff Larson's main goal is to keep everyone safe. There are numerous lakes in MC. To alert Sheriff Larson to specific concerns, he can be reached at 320-632-0189. For nuisance calls, call the Sheriff's Office at 320-632-9233. And for all emergencies always call 911. Boat owners and Jet Ski owners need to check their vehicles for proper registration. Sheriff Larson reviewed incidents in Scandia Valley Township (SVT) from 3/1/23 thru 5/31/23. There were 128 incidents compared to 324 incidents for the same timeframe in the year 2022. The population for SVT is 1315. During the summer months the population double/triples. Some PO expressed concern about the noise from Jet Skis. Jet skis need to be 150 feet from shore, docks, anchored boats and swimmers. A youth Jet Ski operator, who is under the age of 18 is required to have watercraft permit and remain in the sight of a parent. The Sheriff Office consults with the DNR to determine if a 300 ft No Wake Zone is necessary. Last year's no-wake zone signage is still posted at the public landing. Sheriff Larson will remove it. It is not legal to drive golf carts on the roadways. MC does not enforce this law unless they are causing a problem. There are no speed limits for boats or jet skis. MC hires seasonal help. These persons cannot write citations or carry a gun, but they can call for support as needed. Dogs cannot run freely. If a dog is causing a problem, he suggested to work it out with your neighbor first if possible before calling the department. There are currently no reports of problem bears. To prevent bear problems don't leave food outside and take bird feeders in at night.

2. Matt LeBlanc, MC Administrator: Matt has been MC Administrator for 18 months. MC has a 1 percent employee vacancy rate. Scandia Valley Lakes Area 2022 sales was provided by Jean Popp. MC's Public Works has several large projects this year. They usually spend 9 million dollars annually. This year the budget is \$15 million. Their building, which stored their equipment/trucks was destroyed by a fire in May of 2022. The old structure has been removed and a new structure is being built. The cost for snow plows has increased from \$260,000 to \$330,000. There is little opioid traffic in MC. MC's Auditor/Treasurer resigned 10/22. Shannon Coyle has been appointed acting Auditor/Treasurer. Typically, this is an elected position and served for 4 years. Matt would like this position to be appointed rather than elected in order to secure more qualified personnel. This position will be on the ballot again in 2024. This winter was tough on Public Work's budget. Usually there are 27 snow events per year. However, this winter there were greater than 40. MC is repairing many potholes.

5. Old Business:

A. Aquatic Invasive Species Control Updates: Tom Anderson reported Lake Restoration treated 41 acres for curly-leaf pondweed. The treatment was more expensive this year, costing \$36,000. Lake Restoration has a 3-year contract with the LID. RMB was contracted for the vegetation survey. The invasive species starry stonewort was not detected in this spring's survey. The 2024 proposed PO's assessment has been increased from \$60 to \$100 because of increased CLP treatment cost.

B. Initiative Foundation Endowment Fund Update:

1. Blue Water Science Study: Scott Schnuckle reported Blue Water Science conducted a lake study in 2015 and 2016. Some POs are concerned about whether our treatment of curly-leaf pondweed is causing an increase in other weeds like celery weed. In August Blue Water Science will conduct another lake survey to determine what is changing with the lake, which weeds are present and how zebra mussels have affected the lake. The results of the survey will be reported to the Board at the fall board meeting. Steve McComas will present the results to POs at the 2024 FTLPOA annual meeting.

2. Shoreline buffer grant opportunities: Ron Nypan has completed his shoreline buffer project. He is the first PO to receive the FTLPOA grant. He encouraged PO to come and visit his garden. More grants are available. Grant money may also be available from MC.

3. Water Levels and Beaver Management Update: Scott Schnuckle reported for Brian Sams. This spring MC removed several bogs from under the bridge. Brian removed a beaver dam downstream in Fish Trap Lake Creek. Many beavers have also been trapped. If a beaver is causing harm to a PO's land it can be removed. At this time, the lake level is good and the creek is flowing well. Brian will continue to be on alert for beaver dams and bogs.

4. Floating Bogs and Weed Management: We discussed the growing concern regarding the number of bogs that are breaking free from various shorelines and what can be done when they do. There are limitations on their removal, but lakes that have serious issues have been allowed to remove them at property owners' expense. This can become very expensive when bogs are very large, i.e., tens of thousands of dollars. We are exploring the use of the LID for funding large bog removal and potential help with smaller ones. Our current permit enables us to remove bogs blocking Fish Trap Creek, so additional permitting would be required. At present, property owners are on their own to deal with the bogs. We would like to create a better and more equitable solution.

6. New Business:

A. Comments from the floor: Paul Baker stated the single biggest threat/damage to FTL is fertilizer. Shoreline buffers are the best way to protect the lake. A 15 ft deep shoreline buffer will keep it from entering into the lake. Steve McComas will report on phosphate levels. Mike Flanagan

reported a week after the ice went out there was an algae bloom causing the lake to turn chocolate color and now there is green fuzzy stuff floating in the water. On fishing opener, which was 11 days after ice out the water temperature was already 61 degrees.

7. Future Board Interest: Scott Schnuckle reported board members Chuck Salter, Brian Sams and Mike Meis have completed their terms and would like to continue to serve. Gary Ziehmman motioned to re-elect all three board members. Paul Baker seconded it and the motion carried by a vote of the FTLPOA members present at the meeting. Scott asked POs to consider becoming a board member. There is always a need for a backup.

9. Adjournment: The FTLPOA Meeting adjourned at 11:20 AM.

Meeting called to order 9:30

1. **Secretary's Report** — The recap from the summer property owners and board meeting has been revised to include the membership vote on board, information about bogs, etc.
2. **Treasurer's Report** — Financial report was reviewed and accepted. The estimated ending balance for 2023 is \$19,500. There are 169 property owner association members for 2023 (approximately 2/3 participation). Scott's letter in the upcoming newsletter will mention the positive things the board has influenced (railroad crossing, boat cleaning station, etc.).
3. **Old Business**
 - A. CD3 Boat Cleaning Station Update (Chuck) – System software analytics show the system was used 969 times May - Sept YTD. The LID had agreed to pay \$1,025 per year to take care of software maintenance and share the data with the county. Chuck confirmed that commitment was for five years. Payments have been paid for 2022 and 2023. The Lake Owners Association takes care of tools and pumping the holding tank. We replaced the old plastic boat plug wrench with a more durable aluminum one. The holding tank is only at 19%. Chuck will check to see if 20% is ok to leave in so it doesn't crack in the winter. Amy Kowalzek from Morrison County asked if we'd heard from anyone who had used it. Scott will share input to include:
 - a. One thing could be improved is something to scrape off zebras.
 - b. Three-minute timer on air pressure isn't enough. You get half way around the boat and have to push the button again
 - c. People aren't coiling hoses back up and putting things away. Board members have been periodically checking and putting things back in order.
 - B. Initiative Foundation Endowment Fund (Gary)
 - a. Current year contributions to the fund = \$1,290 making the current value of the fund \$66,840.
 - b. Blue Water Science Study had been approved at the Spring meeting. We will pay the \$2900 study fee out of the regular account since we have enough budget. The study wasn't done until the end of August. We have received the preliminary report with the full report coming out in the Spring. Celery weed is a native plant and prolific in Fish Trap. It's good for the lake; great for holding small fish, gives off oxygen and helps filter water. We had very little curly leaf after our treatments and celery weed was first to move in. People are mis-naming celery weed as curly leaf. We want another SECCHI reading (measuring visibility test for the water). Rain causes "bloom" in the lake; washing nutrients from the shore. Since it was so dry this year we didn't get the bloom. Tom will work with the LID to pursue a lab to complete testing.
 - C. Water Levels and Beaver Management (Brian) This spring we pulled out 2 beaver dams and trapped 9 beavers out of the creek. We started the season with high water and we're down about 2 feet from the Spring. Mid-May/early June the water was down to the control structure (dam). The DNR has taken the rails off the dam. We need to keep the beaver population down so will continue to trap.
 - D. Website/Newsletter (Chris) Anything for the fall newsletter is due by October 20th. (The Fall issue is mailed only to dues-paid members). To keep printing and postage costs down, the newsletter is limited to 8 pages. We can put as many articles on the website as we want. Scott will ask Blue Water Science for more information on celery weed, asking him to write a brief article about celery weed (native, good for the lake, not curly leaf) and include side-by-side pictures of celery weed vs curly leaf. Website will say look for the Blue Water Science article coming out this Spring.
 - E. DNR Updates (Paul)
 - a. Dock upgrade - The DNR has provided a new floating dock for the public landing.
 - b. Fisheries – We were stocked as promised (walleye) this spring. It was a banner year for walleye, bass and crappie. The bass taste great from our lake and have become a favorite among resort guests. The DNR are still using gill net testing. We are encouraging them to use electric testing (fish are stunned and recover). A challenge is where they can do electric testing isn't necessarily where walleye hang out. If the DNR can't test the success rate, they won't stock so we could risk our walleye stocking if they switch testing methods. Brian reported that only 20-30% of his resort guests are avid fishers. Fishing now tends to be more recreational so there's less pressure on the lake.
4. **New Business**
 - A. LID Updates (Tom/Chris) - Tom will begin this week to explore testing labs we can contract with. The LID voted at annual meeting to raise assessment from \$60 to \$100 per property to increase their operating balance. We've had two years of massive weed treatment areas (more than previous years) and costs of weed control are higher.

- B. Morrison County Updates (Scott) – Amy Kowalzek says they’ve been focusing on agricultural areas of the county and now they’re considering some changes in lakeshore use ordinances to be presented to the Board of Commissioners later this year or early next year.
5. **Date for Spring Meeting** – Saturday, April 13th. Campfire Bay 9:30 at the Lodge unless otherwise notified.
6. **Adjournment** – Brian motioned to adjourn; Gary seconded. Meeting adjourned at 11:18 a.m.
